## Congregation of St. Joseph Announces Major Grant Gift Awarded to Laudato Si' Movement Supports Care of Earth and People

The Congregation of St. Joseph announces it is making its largest gift to date in support of Laudato Si' efforts that are part of the global Laudato Si' Movement.

The \$1 million-dollar multi-year grant moves an ongoing partnership between the congregation and the Laudato Si' Movement to a deeper level and builds on a history of collaboration around a shared purpose. The mission of the Congregation of St. Joseph is to bring, *"all into unity with God, with one another, and with all creation."* With support from the congregation, the Laudato Si' Movement, which is based on the Pope's encyclical by the same name, promotes these values within the context of the planetary crisis.

As the consequences of climate change and biodiversity loss affect more and more people across the United States and around the world, Catholics find themselves at a turning point. This is the critical moment to honor our Creator and care for each other by protecting Earth, our common home.

Support from the congregation enables the Laudato Si' Movement to equip a vibrant network of lay leaders to engage their communities in this effort. As noted by Pope Francis, "The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together." (Laudato Si', 13) By working together, this collaborative community of care for creation can develop new approaches and create greater impact.
