Celebrating 375 Years of Service and Presence

This year, the Congregation of St. Joseph joins with other communities of Sisters of St. Joseph worldwide in celebrating the 375th anniversary of our founding!



In 1650, six ordinary women who shared a common desire to grow in their love of God and serve the unmet needs of the people around them, began meeting in a small kitchen in Le Puy-en-Velay, France. Under the patronage of St. Joseph and the spiritual guidance of Father Jean-Pierre Medaille, SJ, they went out into the city and among the people to minister to the poor and vulnerable whom they called their

dear neighbors. This was not common as most women religious of the time were cloistered and remained behind

convent walls. They wore widows black in order to move about the city unaccompanied, and supported themselves by making lace. These first six sisters are represented by the six dots along the top of the logo along with lace and the skyline of Le Puy visible in the background.





From these humble beginnings, the order grew under the leadership of Mother St. John Fontbonne (left), later expanding to the U.S. and Wichita, and communities all over the world. Just as these first pioneering women did in 1650, Sisters of St. Joseph continue to respond to the unmet and critical needs of the world and the people around us. Our mission – to love God and neighbor without distinction – is at the heart of all we do.



PRESERVATION EFFORTS ON OUR WICHITA CAMPUS

In 2018, the Congregation of St. Joseph built the new **Mount St. Mary's Center** in Wichita. It is a wonderful addition to our campus where sisters and residents are able to comfortably age in place in a light-filled, energy efficient space that is right-sized for our current and future needs. Considerable time was spent discerning what would be best for the old motherhouse. For a few years we were able to offer local non-profits space there, however the cost of maintaining the building and later lack of interest in occupying it brought us to a decision – it was time to conserve resources and deconstruct the building. This process was completed earlier this year. During deconstruction, we carefully set aside special items that were gifted to us. With your help, we plan to move these items to new places of honor on the Mount Saint Mary's campus.

STATUE OF MARY THE BLESSED MOTHER

This statue of Mary the Blessed Mother graced the top of our former convent for over 100 years beginning in 1903. A gift of Reverend Felix Ward, C.P., and Miss Lelia Hardin Bugg, it miraculously survived a 1913 fire which destroyed the convent and even melted the statue's metal supports! In 1915, Our Lady was once again placed at the top of the new convent until she was removed and placed in storage prior to deconstruction. Now, with the help of donors like you, we will place Our Lady in front of Mount Saint Mary's Center where she can once again welcome all to our home.









SUNDIAL

After our Sisters arrived in Kansas in 1888, the first decade was a struggle as they moved from Abilene to Parsons to St. Paul. In 1898, the Most Reverend John J. Hennessy, DD called the Sisters to Wichita. In 1903, Bishop Hennessy gifted the Sisters this sundial to commemorate their arrival. Now, with the help of donors like you, it will be placed in front of Mount St. Mary's Center.

BELL

In 1939, the indigenous Mexican people of Del Norte, Colorado gifted a bell to the Sisters in appreciation for establishing and running the area's only hospital. It was placed at the top of the convent and rung for daily Angelus, funerals, and more. With the help of donors like you, it will be electronically enabled and placed in a new tower outside of the chapel at Mount St. Mary's Center.

"The most rewarding part is watching participants regain confidence and learn new skills—sometimes for the first time," she said. She added that she's witnessed tremendous growth from StepStone's early days to its more recent expansion.

Angela says she dreams of a world where places like StepStone are no longer necessary, but remains committed until that day. After 18 years, her belief in the resilience of survivors remains as strong as ever. •
